Peace caravan tours in Sahel and Sahara region

Music festivals from Morocco and Mali bring hope to a divided region

Three major music festivals from the Sahara region join their strengths to start a new initiative: The Cultural Caravan for Peace. Over a period of two months they will travel to refugee camps and festivals to play their music and share their culture. Countries visited are Morocco, Mauretania, Burkina Faso and Mali.

The first edition of the Cultural Caravan for Peace will be held during the Festival Taragalte in M'Hamid El Ghizlane (Morocco) from 15-17 November 2013.

The Caravan of Peace is initiated by Festival Taragalte (M'Hamid, Morocco), the Festival au Désert (Timbuktu, Mali) and the Festival sur le Niger (Segou, Mali) in order to support peace, solidarity and tolerance in the region.

The Caravan takes a serious stand against violence and Islamic radicalism, which are against music and non-Muslims. The extremist threat is a worldwide challenge and the Peace Caravan fights against this influence, communicating through artistic expression and culture, that 'this has nothing to do with our way of life!'

By re-establishing the tradition of the caravan and the historic practices of the desert lifestyle, we want to establish an opportunity to gather and discuss/describe current issues through culture and art.

Through music, workshops and art exhibitions the Caravan will give the people of the Sahara and Sahel a platform to meet, exchange ideas and keep their cultural heritage alive.

Mohamed Ansar (Festival au Désert) outlined, that "Under this strong sign of the 'Cultural Caravan for Peace' we want to express our way of non-violent but effective resistance against intolerance but also to express solidarity with these people in need - refugees in Mali and neighbouring countries". And Mamou Daffé (Festival sur le Niger) added: "We believe that art and culture bring people together and they get inspiration from each other to contribute to the balance of the society." Ibrahim Sbai (taragalte Festival): "The role played by the caravan in the old days was not only economical, but more significally a cultural one. These caravans meant that different cultures were in contact and were able to connect with each other; exchanges passed through families, music, poetry art and lifestyles. These activities brought people closer to each other."

During the festival in Morocco several workshops and artists' exchange programmes are initiated. The workshops are facilitated by Butterfly Works.



Weaving Art in the Moroccan Sahara

International artists and local Moroccan communities will co-create an inspiring art piece in the majestic backdrop of the M'hamid oasis boarding the Sahara. This exciting community art project will happen during the Taragalte Music Festival 2013, a three day World Music and Saharan Heritage event in the Moroccan desert.

The artwork will use plastic bags, palm leaves, plastic bottles, left over textiles and other found materials to tell the story of the Sahara and its makers. By weaving together recycled materials using traditional techniques handed down through many generations, an unusual colourful combination of patterns and structures will lead to the creation of a vibrant generation spanning installation: a carpet that will reflect the energy of the festival.

The piece will be made by artist Erik Hoogendorp - JiHaa (The Netherlands) with support from local *Carpet of Life* assistant Lea Liabastre and co-created by members from various communities around M'Hamid. The inspiration comes from the traditional Boucheroite carpets that are currently made by the women involved in 'Carpet of Life'.

'Carpet of Life' is a textile co-design project where clients have their old but still cherished clothes transformed into a unique carpet made by the women in the villages around M'hamid.

EriK Hoogendorp - JiHaa: 'I am very excited to be part of this experience and looking forward to interact with the local community. During the festival we will see the artwork grow. A carpet that will reflect the energy of the festival. Combining the local carpet specialist skills with my own will result in new structures, -familiar materials will show up in a new way.'

The initiators of this community art project are to the organizers of the Taragalte Festival, Butterfly Works and Erik JiHaa.

Taragalte is a music festival that takes place from 15th to 17th November 2013. The Taragalte Festival is a key cultural destination in the South of Morocco and is based 7 kilometres outside of M'Hamid el Ghiszlane.



Taragalte Festival 2013 more energetic than ever

This year the Festival's major theme will be "Caravan" in order to pay tribute to the great trans-Saharan caravan route that used to depart from M'Hamid and linked Morocco to Mali and other regions.

Ibrahim Sbai - Artistic Director of the Taragalte festival: "The role played by the caravans was not only economical, but more significantly a cultural one. These caravans meant that different cultures were in contact and were able to connect with each other; exchanges passed through families, music, poetry, art and lifestyles. These activities brought people closer to each other, creating awareness of other cultures, cross cultural cooperation and a collective strength to address the environmental challenges. This is exactly the role of the caravan we want to foster, revive and revitalize!"

During this year's edition of the festival, Taragalte will host the kick off of the wonderful 'Cultural Caravan of Peace', a collaborative initiative between the Taragalte Festival, Festival au Desert (Mali) and Festival du Niger (Mali). Over the coming months after the Taragalte Festival the caravan will travel to refugee camps and festivals to play music, share cultures and spread the message of peace, solidarity and tolerance!



This year's festival will also host the AZALAI-Nomadic Lab project which is collaboration between six cultural organizations in Italy, France, Belgium, Hungary, Holland and Serbia. During the 2013 festival several workshops and artists' exchange programmes are initiated. Some of the workshops are facilitated by Butterfly Works.

The Festival

"Caravan" as theme for the 5th edition of the Taragalte Festival

"The caravan" will be the central theme of this fifth edition of the Taragalte Festival. This theme was chosen to revitalize the historical role and importance of the trans-Saharan caravan and to rekindle the economic experiences, cultural exchanges and human connections that happen at M'Hamid El Ghizlane (Taragalte) – the crossroads for the caravans between Morocco and the Sahara regions.

This year, the festival welcomes for the first time two, one-off projects, the first is; the conclusion of the European AZALAI Project and the second, the launch of the 'Cultural Caravan for Peace'. This year the Taragalte Festival is also very proud to partner with Festicket, a UK based specialist in online Festival ticket and packages.



Cultural Caravan for Peace

The Cultural Caravan for Peace is a Sahélo-transaharian project initiated by the Festival au Désert (Timbuktu, Mali), the Festival sur le Niger (Segou, Mali) and the Taragalte Festival to support peace, solidarity and tolerance in the region.

Its vision is to encourage a dialog, cultural exchanges and enhance awareness on environmental issues of the Sahara and the Sahel region. Through music, workshops and art expositions, the Caravan aims to create a platform to meet and exchange ideas around the development and perpetuation of cultural heritage. The first Cultural Caravan for Peace will be held during the Taragalte Festival from 15th until 17th of November and will present different artists as ambassadors of the three festivals. In order to strengthen regional solidarity, the Caravan will continue its



journey visiting shelters for Malian refugees in Mauritania and Burkina Faso. The next stop on the caravan route is Festival au Désert in January 2014 with final site on the banks of the Niger River at the Festival sur le Niger, Ségou (Mali) in February 2014.

Azalai-Laboratoire Nomade Project (http://azalai.wordpress.com/)

The Nomad AZALAI-Lab project, is a recipient of support from the European Union, "Culture" 1.2.1, born from the collaboration between six cultural organisations in Italy, France, Belgium, Hungary, Holland, and Serbia. Its objective is to open up new networks for cultural cooperation between Europe and Africa. It offers a platform for dialogue, facilitating the expression of African identities beyond the continent and through a prism refracts new cultural relations with contemporary Europe. This particular project will work through musical creation in residence, training workshops, conferences, and cultural exchange. Having already worked in six European countries since July 2012, the project will culminate in a conference and music production in collaboration with the Taragalte Festival.

Our Story - 'A Meeting Place in the Sahara'

The Taragalte Festival was created by a team of Moroccan with nomadic ancestry wishing to contribute, in collaboration with local, national and international actors to human development in their region of the Sahara. Based on the traditional, age old Moussem the festival happens in M'Hamid El Ghizlane (South Eastern Morocco) and celebrated the return of trade caravans after months spent travelling through the desert.

The current festival is based on the age-old concept of the traditional Moussem (annual Souk) — a festival held when the trade caravans of neighbouring communities entered the bountiful oasis of Taragalte (M'hamid) after traveling across the desert for many months. "Taragalte" means "meeting place" and although the name has changed, the spirit remains and around this socio-cultural festival, people will gather and share the essence of life in the Sahara. The festival will revive the tangible and intangible heritage of the desert by promoting exchanges between the diverse communities from the North African Sahara and the rest of the world. Through art, music, workshops, exhibitions and conferences, the festival provides a pragmatic platform for the sustainable development.

Launched in 2009, the Taragalte Festival this year celebrates its 5th anniversary. Every year since its birth, artists and festival goers from Morocco and around the world have met here, a place between the Atlas Mountains and the dunes of the Sahara. They've come to enjoy the local people's great hospitality, rich culture and openness – an openness which breeds creativity and artistic expression.

Over the years, the festival has developed various activities to value the regions' richness and diversity and promote tourism, which in turn directly benefits the economy and society all year around. These include the 'Carpet of Life' – women empowerment initiative and the Bivouac – Le Petit Prince, a sustainable tourism programme aimed at improving the socio-economic environment in the region.

Halim Sbai – Director of the Taragalte festival



"The idea for the caravan started a couple of years ago, says Halim, during the first ever meetings with Ansar Many (Festival au Desert). We were both convinced that the indifference in the communities of our rich culture, history and heritage was a great concern. This meant that we were also losing the unity that once brought together the many tribes of the Sahara in south Eastern Morocco and those of the Great desert in Mali. And so we decided to do some about it and began to partner. A group of Saharan civil



society organizations, with the common goals of working to preserve our cultures, building sustainably and speaking in one voice - for peace, solidarity and tolerance across the whole Sahara and Sahel region!"

History

As a meeting place for the trans-Saharan trade caravans in the sixteenth century, Taragalte (former name of M'Hamid El Ghizlane) was one of the main cities of the province of Draa. According to the historian Jacques Meunié in his book "Sahara Morocco from origins until 1670" Taragalte was populated by more than twenty thousand people of whom 2000 were of Jewish faith. Taragalte was located on the banks of the Oued Draa, the largest river in the region that cuts through the Atlas Mountains near Ouarzazate and empties into the mighty Atlantic Ocean, after travelling over 2200 kilometres. The land was very fertile and used for agriculture and grazing allowing people to live very comfortably.

The trans-Saharan trade caravans continued to roam the Sahara until the middle of the twentieth century. M'hamid El Ghizlane is a magical place in the desert that helps and inspires a lot of national and international artists create.

Visitors are inspired by this traditional and unique lifestyle attributed to the nomads in this part of Morocco and as a consequence visitors and local communities alike benefit from the platform of co-creation rooted in history and express this, through arts, exhibitions and indigenously inspired products and crafts.

Our Desert spirit

Vision, Mission and Objectives

Dream (Vision)

Taragalte envisages a network of global citizens and festivals contributing to the sustainable development of the Sahara and wider Sahel region through intercultural exchange, responsible practice and environmental conservation.

Goal (Mission)

Cultural regeneration: to contribute to the sustainable development of the Sahara by organising the festival and a trans-boundary 'Cultural Caravan for Peace', involving Festival au Desert (Mali) and Festival sur le Niger (Mali).

Environmental restoration: to contribute to the restoration and recovery of the desert ecosystem by raising awareness around the issue of desertification (main threat in this region) and in doing so connect academic research with local knowledge and manpower to co-create alternative solutions to an every-present threat.



Activities (Objectives)

- Reinforce the cultural exchanges between different Saharan communities and develop cooperation between different African and European events and festivals. E.g. Cultural Caravan of Peace and Nomad AZALAI-Lab project (See Collaborators for more).
- Enhance and promote the tangible and intangible heritage of the region around M'Hamid El Ghizlane.



- Raise awareness of the necessity to respect the fragile desert environment and allow its discovery, through; research, knowledge gathering and sharing and pragmatic integration.
- Make the festival an important vector for the local development, and a means of promoting sustainable tourism in Morocco.

Le Petit Prince is part of a wider Taragalte Concept; a tourism based sustainable development initiative. Through their shared vision the aim is to contribute to the preservation and evolution of their ancestral heritage in the M'hamid region. Through the right type of tourism that is ecologically sensitive and culturally aware and involving, the bivouac brings sustainable benefits. <u>Carpet of Life</u> (http://carpetoflife.com/tagged/makers)

Using authentic crafts handed down through generations, women from different villages in the oasis of M'hamid El Ghizlane transform people's beloved wardrobe into a vibrant Carpet of Life – an inspiring artwork they cherish forever.

The Carpet of Life concept is based on traditional Moroccan carpets called Boucherouite or Boucherwi, made by most families from nomadic background. This craft relies on instinct and experience rather than set design rules. Details are derived from nature, perfumes, sounds and tastes. Boucherouite carpets can be made from almost anything... second-hand clothing, tea towels, bed linen, even plastics! (Other materials include: recycled rag strips and yarns from 'found' textile remnants including wool, cotton, synthetic fibers, lurex and nylon).

Desertification has over the last decade become the single largest threat to the desert villages like M'hamid. One way to stave off desertification is planting trees that thrive in these arid conditions. The tamarisk is an example of one such a tree; a tree with a deep root structure, that traps both sand and moisture, making it possible to plant other species of trees in the immediate vicinity. Through donations it is possible to plant trees, and this is done by tourists in collaboration with the villagers as they will take care of the tree until it is mature enough to survive on its own.

Initially, there was Tuareg song and dance, pottery, camel races and games during the festival. Today, the festival is open to the outside world and welcomes artists from all over Mali, other African countries, and the rest of the world.

Festival sur le Niger (http://www.festivalsegou.org/)

The Festival sur le Niger (2014) will be held from February $6^{th} - 9^{th}$ on the banks of the Niger River. The festival is an initiative born through the support of the municipality and cultural authorities of Segou. Their intention was to create a unique event that highlights the attractions and potential of the city and the region; a festival that supports both the local economy and promotes the arts and culture of Mali.
